What are the aims and intentions of this curriculum?

Citizenship Education is concerned not only with preparing students to pass their GCSE examination but also to become active citizens who are well aware of the rights and responsibilities as productive members of the society. Throughout the academic year, the following topics will be examined: Human Rights and Responsibilities, UK's Legal and Justice System, Democracy and Sources of Law. Furthermore, they will learn ways in which the UK Media helps to uphold Democracy as well as the Rights and Responsibilities of said media. Learners will also examine various International organizations that are sacrosanct to the UK as a country. These topics serve to create the platform needed to understand the UK as a leading developed nation and its role in a globalised world.
