## What are the aims and intentions of this curriculum?

The Year 11 Citizenship curriculum culminates by amalgamating the various concepts learned throughout both Key Stage Three and Four coherent with the AQA course outline. Throughout the academic year, the following topics will be studied: Research and Campaign/investigation and Pressure Groups, Universal Human Rights, UK Local and Devolved Government, UK Politics - the Wider World and The UK and international relations. Overall the knowledge gained in Year 11, combined with the previous concepts explored, are key to the successful completion of the examination to be sat this year. Revision of important concepts will also play a key role and as such learners will revisit these during their Year 11 studies.
